Courses in humanities, social sciences, natural sciences, and engineering. Bachelor of Arts (B.A.), Bachelor of Science (B.S.), and Bachelor of Liberal Studies (B.L.S.)

Graduate School of Arts & Sciences:

Courses for college graduates. Master of Arts (M.A.), Master of Science (M.S.), Master of Philosophy (M.PHIL.), Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.).

School of Architecture:

Courses for college graduates. Professional degree: Master of Architecture (M.Arch.); non-professional degree: Master of Environmental Design (M.E.D.).

School of Art:

Professional courses for college and art school graduates. Master of Fine Arts (M.F.A.)

Divinity School:

Courses for college graduates. Master of Divinity (M.Div.), Master of Arts in Religion (M.A.R.). Qualified students may enroll for degree of Master of Sacred Theology (S.T.M.).

School of Drama:

Courses for college graduates and certificate students. Master of Fine Arts (M.F.A.), Doctor of Fine Arts (D.F.A.).

School of Forestry and Environmental Studies:

Courses for college graduates. Master of Forestry (M.F.), Master of Forestry Science (M.F.S.), Master of Environmental Studies (M.E.S.) and Doctor of Forestry (D.F.).

Law School:

Courses for college graduates. Master of Studies in Law (M.S.L.), Juris Doctor (J.D.). Graduate work: Master of Laws (LL.M.), Doctor of the Science of Law (J.S.D.), and Doctor of Civil Law (D.C.L.).

School of Management:

Courses for college graduates. Professional degree: Master of Public and Private Management (M.P.P.M.). Doctoral courses in management.

School of Medicine:

Courses for college graduates and students who have completed requisite training in approved institutions. Doctor of Medicine (M.D.). Postgraduate study in the basic sciences and clinical subjects. Course in public health for qualified students. Master of Public Health (M.P.H.), Doctor of Public Health (Dr. P.H.). Physician Associate (P.A.) certificate in Primary Care.

School of Music:

Courses for college graduates. Master of Music (M.M.), Master of Musical Arts (M.M.A.), and Doctor of Musical Arts (D.M.A.)

School of Nursing:

Courses for college graduates. Master of Science in Nursing (M.S.N.).

Summer and Special Programs:

Every summer approximately 1,500 Yale and non-Yale students enroll for various summer programs. The 1994 summer programs were in Science and Mathematics, Humanities and Social Sciences, Summer Language Institute, Drama Program and Art.

Undergraduate Majors:

The most popular majors in 1994-95 were: History, Economics, Political Science and English. Percentage of Junior and Senior majors in general categories: Arts & Humanities: 44%; Social Sciences: 30%; Bio. & Physical Sciences: 26%.

Athletics:

Of the 33 intercollegiate sports offered at Yale, 16 are for men and 17 are for women; crew (m/w), lightweight crew (m), cross country (m/w), field hockey (w), football (m), golf (m/w), soccer (m/w), tennis (m/w), volleyball (w), basketball (m/w), fencing (m/w), gymnastics (w), hockey (m/w), squash (m/w), swimming (m/w), track/indoor (m/w), track/outdoor (m/w), baseball (m), lacrosse (m/w), and softball (w). Yale's intramural sports program revolves around the 12 residential colleges, with over 1,600 contests scheduled in over 33 sports. Competition is designed for coed, men's, and women's leagues. 20% of students participate in intercollegiate sports. 50% of students participate in intramural sports. Yale is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA Division I, IAA Football), the East Coast Athletic Conference (ECAC), and the Ivy League Conference.
