Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) and Bachelor of Science (B.S.).</p> <p><u>Graduate School of Arts and Sciences:</u> Courses for college graduates. Master of Arts (M.A.), Master of Engineering (M. ENG.), Master of Science (M.S.), Master of Philosophy (M.PHIL.), and Doctor of Philosophy (P.H.D.).</p> <p><u>School of Architecture:</u> Courses for college graduates. Professional degree: Master of Architecture (M.ARCH.); nonprofessional degree: Master of Environmental Design (M.E.D.).</p> <p><u>School of Art:</u> Professional courses for college and art school graduates. Master of Fine Arts (M.F.A.).</p> <p><u>Divinity School:</u> Courses for college graduates. Master of Divinity (M.DIV.) and Master of Arts in Religion (M.A.R.). Individuals with an M.DIV. degree may apply for the program leading to the degree of Master of Sacred Theology (S.T.M.).</p> <p><u>School of Drama:</u> Courses for college graduates and certificate students. <p><u>Yale Summer Session:</u> Every summer approximately 1,500 Yale and non-Yale students enroll for various summer programs in the Summer Session. Many are conducted overseas. Courses in the Yale Summer Session are in most cases identical in content and method to courses offered in Yale College during the regular academic year.</p>	<p><u>Athletics:</u></p> <p>Of the 35 intercollegiate sports offered at Yale, 16 are for men, 18 are for women, and one is co-ed: crew (m/w), lightweight/heavyweight crew (m), cross country (m/w), field hockey (w), football (m), golf (m/w), soccer (m/w), tennis (m/w), volleyball (w), basketball (m/w), fencing (m/w), gymnastics (w), ice hockey (m/w), squash (m/w), swimming & diving (m/w), track/indoor (m/w), track/outdoor (m/w), baseball (m), lacrosse (m/w), sailing (co-ed, w) and softball (w). Yale's intramural sports program revolves around the 12 residential colleges, with over 1,600 contests scheduled in over 35 sports. Competition is designed for coed, men's, and women's leagues. 20% of students participate in intercollegiate sports. 50% of students participate in intramural sports. Yale is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA Division I, IAA Football), the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC), and the Ivy League. Yale sponsors thirty-five club sport teams in addition to its varsity and intramural programs. Some of Yale's more active club sports are rugby, Tae Kwon Do, polo, equestrian, ballroom dance, and cycling. The Athletics Department also offers more than 75 sections of physical education instruction in both the fall and spring semesters.</p>
