## Yale College:

Courses in humanities, social sciences, natural sciences, mathematical and computer sciences, and engineering. Bachelor of Arts (B.A.) and Bachelor of Science (B.S.).

## Yale Graduate School of Arts and Sciences:

Courses for college graduates. Master of Arts (M.A.), Master of Engineering (M. ENG.), Master of Science (M.S.), Master of Philosophy (M.PHIL.), and Doctor of Philosophy (PH.D.).

## Yale Professional Schools:

#### School of Architecture

Courses for college graduates. Professional degree: Master of Architecture (M.ARCH.); nonprofessional degree: Master of Environmental Design (M.E.D.).

#### School of Art

Professional courses for college and art school graduates. Master of Fine Arts (M.F.A.).

## Divinity School

Courses for college graduates. Master of Divinity (M.DIV.), Master of Arts in Religion (M.A.R.). Individuals with an M.DIV. degree may apply for the program leading to the degree of Master of Sacred Theology (S.T.M.).

#### School of Drama

Courses for college graduates and certificate students. Master of Fine Arts (M.F.A.), Certificate in Drama, One-Year Technical Internship (Certificate), Doctor of Fine Arts (D.F.A.).

## School of Forestry & Environmental Studies

Courses for college graduates. Master of Forestry (M.F.), Master of Forest Science (M.F.S.), Master of Environmental Science (M.E.SC.), Master of Environmental Management (M.E.M.), Doctor of Philosophy (PH.D.)

### Law School

Courses for college graduates. Juris Doctor (J.D.), Master of Laws (LL.M.), Doctor of the Science of Law (J.S.D.), Master of Studies in Law (M.S.L.).

### School of Management

Courses for college graduates. Professional degree: Master of Business Administration (M.B.A.).

## School of Medicine

Courses for college graduates and students who have completed requisite training in approved institutions. Doctor of Medicine (M.D.). Postgraduate study in the basic sciences and clinical subjects. Combined programs with the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences leading to Doctor of Medicine and Doctor of Philosophy (M.D./PH.D.) and to Doctor of Medicine and Master of Health Science (M.D./M.H.S.). Master of Medical Science (M.M.SC.) from the Physician Associate Program.

# School of Music

Graduate professional studies in performance, composition, and conducting. Certificate in Performance, Master of Music (M.M.), Master of Musical Arts (M.M.A.), Artist Diploma, Doctor of Musical Arts (D.M.A.).

## School of Nursing

Courses for college graduates. Master of Science in Nursing (M.S.N.), Post Master's Certificate, Doctor of Nursing Science (D.N.SC.).

## **School of Public Health**

Courses in public health for qualified students. Master of Public Health (M.P.H.).

## Yale Summer Session:

Every summer approximately 1,500 Yale and non-Yale students enroll for various summer programs in the Summer Session. Many are conducted abroad. Courses in the Yale Summer Session are in most cases identical in content and method to courses offered in Yale College during the regular academic year.

The most popular majors in 2008-09 were: Political Science, History, and Economics. Percentage of Junior and Senior majors in general categories - Arts & Humanities: 40%; Social Sciences: 40% and Biological & Physical Sciences: 20%.

### Athletics:

Of the 35 intercollegiate sports offered at Yale, 16 are for men, 18 are for women, and one is co-ed: crew (m/w), lightweight/heavyweight crew (m), cross country (m/w), field hockey (w), football (m), golf (m/w), soccer (m/w), tennis (m/w), volleyball (w), basketball (m/w), fencing (m/w), gymnastics (w), ice hockey (m/w), squash (m/w), swimming & diving (m/w), track/indoor (m/w), track/outdoor (m/w), baseball (m), lacrosse (m/w), sailing (co-ed, w) and softball (w). Yale's intramural sports program revolves around the 12 residential colleges, with over 1,600 contests scheduled in over 35 sports. Competition is designed for coed, men's, and women's leagues. 20% of students participate in intercollegiate sports. 50% of students participate in intramural sports. Yale is a member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA Division I, IAA Football), the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC), and the Ivy League. Yale sponsors forty-eight club sport teams in addition to its varsity and intramural programs. Some of Yale's more active club sports are men's and women's rugby, men's and women's water polo, downhill skiing, Tae Kwon Do, equestrian, ballroom dance, and cycling. The Athletics Department also offers more than 75 sections of physical education instruction in both the fall and spring semesters, with approximately 1,250 students, faculty, and staff enrolled in those classes.
